SECTION 1. SUMMARY OF PRIORITY SELECTION CRITERIA

This Small Community Air Service Development Program (SCASDP) grant application for San Bernardino International Airport (SBD) meets the criteria of Docket DOT-OST-2022-0003. The San Bernardino International Airport Authority (SBIAA), the airport sponsor, is requesting \$1,000,000 to implement a \$1,879,300 air service initiative. The goal is nonstop service to Sacramento International Airport (SMF) on Breeze Airways.

SBD was formed following the closure of the Norton Air Force Base in the 1990s. After years of environmental remediation and infrastructure construction, SBD is focused on cargo and passenger air service development. SBD has become the fastest growing cargo airport in the country, projected to be a top 25 cargo airport in the U.S. with more than 1.5 billion tons of landed weight in 2022.





SBD's pursuit of passenger service has borne fruit with an initial partnership with Breeze. SBD and the Inland Valley Development Agency (IVDA) have partnered with Breeze to bring the first commercial service to SBD in August 2022, recently announced San Francisco International Airport (SFO) service. SBD and Breeze believe that SFO service will be the first of many successful routes; however, in today's airline environment, it is critical to have a strong incentive program to support service. SBD, IVDA and Breeze have partnered for the new SFO service, and this application is to support nonstop service to SMF as SBD's second route. This grant is critical to the ability for SBD and Breeze to compete in the Inland Empire (i.e., San Bernardino-Ontario-Riverside, CA Metropolitan Statistical Area [MSA]) to grow sufficiently to attract passengers. The second route to SMF will help be that catalyst to grow SBD into a strong passenger service airport.

Airfare Higher than National Average

Today, SBD catchment area air travelers are forced to drive to alternate airports, such as Ontario International Airport (ONT) or Los Angeles International Airport (LAX), to access commercial air service. The drive to LAX can range from 90 minutes to four hours based on traffic, not including the additional time for parking, airport congestion and TSA. It is imperative for passengers to build as much as six hours into their travels to fly out of LAX to limit the risk of missing their flights. In addition to the costs associated with hours of travel time, at the 2022 Internal Revenue Service (IRS) allowed

automobile rate of 58.5 cents per mile, it costs travelers approximately \$90 in direct expenses to travel to/from the San Bernardino area to LAX in addition to their airfare. There is a significant expense to local air travelers by not having adequate access to the national air transportation system. While airfares are competitive at airports in the Los Angeles Basin, San Bernardino area air travelers are paying unreasonably high fares when the cost of travel to the alternate airport is accounted for.

Community Funding

It is estimated that a \$1,500,000 revenue guarantee, \$250,000 one-year marketing program and fee waivers will be required for Breeze to add SMF service at SBD. SBD and the community will fund 47 percent of the proposed \$1,879,300 Strategic Plan. **Non-airport revenue sources will fund 43 percent (\$750,000) of the \$1,750,000 cash requirement.**

Public-Private Partnership

SBIAA has formed a public-private partnership in support of new service at SBD. The IVDA, Hillwood and SBIAA are the primary partners in this program. This partnership is poised for success and is ready to continue their successful efforts to begin air service. This public-private partnership has decades of experience working together on projects like this and has been successful in recruiting both cargo and passenger service to SBD.

Material Benefits

SBD is important to the future economic prosperity of San Bernardino County, and its importance will continue to increase with the addition of service to SMF. The Inland Empire is the 13th largest MSA in the country, with nearly five million residents, larger than other major cities like Detroit, Minneapolis, Seattle or San Diego. With limited service from ONT, the Inland Empire has by far the lowest number of seats per person of any top 20 MSA in the country at just 0.7 seats per person in 2019. The next lowest ratio was Philadelphia at 3.2 seats per person, or nearly five times as many seats per person as the Inland Empire. The average of the top 20 MSAs in 2019 was 5.7 seats per person, or over eight times more seats on a per person basis than the Inland Empire. **The Inland Empire is grossly underserved compared to any top MSA in the country**, and with over two million people in SBD's immediate catchment area, this air service initiative will have a major impact on countless people.

Timely Manner

The public-private partnership has a solid schedule and Strategic Plan for timely use of the funds. The IVDA, SBD and Breeze have already partnered on new service announced to SFO for August 2022, and this grant will enable additional service to start shortly after. The research and analysis necessary to determine the viability of new SBD service has been completed. The market demand exists, and feedback from Breeze has been encouraging; however, an incentive package to mitigate the start-up risks will be required. Accordingly, SBD and its partners have created an incentive package as part of the Strategic Plan that addresses the economic risks that an airline will face during start-up. Breeze Airways supports this application (reference letter of support).



SECTION 2. AIR SERVICE ENVIRONMENT

SBD is vital to the economic future of San Bernardino County, and its importance will continue to increase with the expansion of passenger service to a second route. This section shows the broad segment of the traveling public that will benefit from the proposed Strategic Plan.

Market Reach and Potential

SBD has a very large, close-in population compared to many airports. The Inland Empire, including the ONT and SBD catchment areas (reference Exhibit 2.1), represents nearly five million residents encompassing over 27,000 square miles. SBD's primary catchment area has a population of approximately two million residents.

EXHIBIT 2.1 AIRPORT LOCATION



With SBD's first passenger air service scheduled to begin in summer 2022, all air travelers currently divert from the primary catchment area and use other surrounding airports in ONT, LAX, San Diego International Airport (SAN), Orange County and Palm Springs. **Table 2.1** shows the estimated drive time from the San Bernardino community to the primary airports used by SBD catchment area air travelers. ONT, the closest medium hub airport, captures 40 percent of SBD catchment area air travelers. SBD catchment area residents, especially in the areas south and east of SBD, have a drive time to ONT that can exceed 75 minutes. A higher percentage of SBD catchment area travelers, 46 percent, use LAX, the closest large hub airport. The San Bernardino-LAX drive can range from 90 minutes to four hours depending on traffic. At a reimbursable rate of 58.5 cents per mile, this is costly to local businesses adding \$90 or more per trip and the loss of nearly eight hours of travel time. An additional 8 percent of SBD catchment area travelers use SAN, upwards of a three-hour drive.



The air service at ONT is insufficient for the population in the immediate area of 2.6 million, much less the additional two million residents surrounding SBD. Since 2000, population has grown 42 percent in the Inland Empire, while the state of California population grew at only 16 percent. The San Bernardino area has grown significantly, while access to air service has diminished at the close-in ONT, forcing residents to bear more cost and time to travel from LAX, which ultimately suppresses demand by the limited access to the national air transportation system.



Large and Diverse Employers

The SBD catchment area has a dynamic and growing local business community with significant air travel demand. Within SBD's catchment area are several major employers (selected list provided in **Table 2.2**) with extensive travel requirements.

Amazon has become the largest employer in the SBD area, offering countless warehouses and fulfillment centers, as well as Amazon's second largest air hub based at SBD, which will eventually offer as many as 26 daily departures and employ thousands of people. The nearly 660,000-square-foot sorting facility in eastern San Bernardino serves as the southern California headquarters for Amazon's expansive air freight network. In line with Amazon's goal of reaching net-zero carbon emissions by 2040, its San Bernardino air hub includes the company's first ground-power units run on electricity. The units supply aircraft with power while being serviced on the ground. The facility also will operate the company's first electric wide-body pushback tractors in North America. Such ground support equipment will help reduce carbon emissions and cut down on noise on the site. This air service initiative will supplement Amazon's eco-friendly efforts by reducing the amount of congestion on roadways.



Higher Education

The San Bernardino area hosts some of the best higher education institutions in the country. A few of these institutions are highlighted below:

- University system, the largest system of higher education in the country. Its 23 campuses and five off-campus centers, serving more than 400,000 students, extend from Humboldt State in Arcata in the north to San Diego State in the south. CSUSB specifically has an enrollment of nearly 18,000 students, and CSUSB's impact sustains more than 2,000 jobs in the region and 4,700 statewide. CSUSB continues to be nationally ranked in rankings from US News and World Report, Forbes and the Princeton Review.
- University of California, Riverside (UCR): A public research university and one of the 10 general campuses of the University of California system. Widely recognized as one of the most ethnically diverse research universities in the nation, UCR's current enrollment is more than 21,000 students.
- San Bernardino Valley College: Fully accredited, community college. The two-year college
 has an enrollment of more than 12,500 students and covers 82 acres.
- Loma Linda University: Seventh-day Adventist coeducational health sciences university.
 The University comprises eight schools and the Faculty of Graduate Studies and has more than 4,600 students and 1,600 full-time faculty.
- University of Redlands: Private, liberal arts university in Redlands, CA (part of the SBD catchment area). The 2,410 students come from 43 states and 11 countries and support nearly 190 full-time faculty members.
- Crafton Hills College (CHC): One of two colleges in the San Bernardino Community College
 District and one of 112 colleges in the California Community College system, the largest
 college system of higher education in the world. CHC has an enrollment of 2,150 full time
 students and 3,500 part-time students.
- National University: The San Bernardino campus is one of 27 campuses for National
 University in California and Nevada. National University, based in San Diego, is the secondlargest private, nonprofit institution of higher education in California and 12th largest in
 the U.S.

Additional commercial air service at SBD will enhance future regional economic development efforts. San Bernardino County companies rely on commercial air transportation to conduct business in the global economy.



SECTION 3. AIR SERVICE NEEDS AND DEFICIENCIES

This section provides detailed analyses to demonstrate that the SBD catchment area is underserved and in need of improved access to the national air transportation system. Past air service development efforts to address these needs and deficiencies is also provided.



Underserved Metropolitan Statistical Area

With SBD's first passenger service starting in August 2022, the SBD area is the epitome of underserved. While SBD is also in the same overarching MSA as ONT, the overall Inland Empire is the most underserved "large city" in the country. The Inland Empire is the 13th largest MSA, with an estimated 2019 population of nearly 4.8 million people, projected to be near five million people in 2022. To compare different MSAs and their level of air service, a comparison of the number of airline seats to population was analyzed in **Table 3.1**.

In 2019, the Inland Empire offered less than 3.4 million outbound seats with a population of 4.76 million people, averaging out to 0.7 seats per person living in the MSA. For the top 15 MSAs, the average number of seats per person was 5.6. The lowest (besides the Inland Empire) was Philadelphia at 3.2 seats per person.

For the Inland Empire to reach the next lowest number of seats per person, SBD and ONT would need to add 11.9 million additional seats. To add those 11.9 million additional seats to hit even the lowest ratio for any other major city, **SBD and ONT would need to add 217 DAILY departures on 150-seat aircraft.** While SBD qualifies for SCASDP as a non-hub airport with minimal service, the nearby alternate service at ONT is inadequate for their own demands much less the demands of residents in the SBD catchment area.

Significant Catchment Area Demand

The Inland Empire has substantial air service demand, even with being suppressed due to the limited number of seats and options nearby. A true market estimate was performed for the year ended March 31, 2020, for the Inland Empire to quantify the total demand of passengers being generated from the catchment area (**Table 3.2**).

It is estimated that a total of 10.98 million domestic passengers are generated from the Inland Empire, with 45 percent of domestic travelers (4.9 million) flying from ONT and 38 percent (4.2 million) flying from LAX. An additional 17 percent fly from other southern California airports, primarily SAN. From the immediate SBD catchment area with a population of two million people, it is estimated that 4.7 million domestic passengers are generated and more than 2.5 million of those passengers are forced to drive to LAX or SAN, adding hundreds of dollars in additional costs and time to each trip.

The San Francisco Bay Area, including San Jose, has a combined true market size of nearly 750,000 annual origin and destination passengers and was the first route for service from SBD. The proposed service that this SCASDP grant would support to SMF represents a demand of at least 550,270 annual passengers. The significant demand gives





nonstop SBD-SMF service a high probability of success. **Most importantly, service to SMF will** bring tens of thousands of people off the road that today are driving between Sacramento, the state Capital, and the Inland Empire due to reduced service levels compared to historical norms. The Sacramento-Inland Empire market had as many as 700,000 annual <u>flown</u> origin and destination passengers as recently as 2006; however, significantly reduced schedules between ONT and SMF has severely impacted the number of passengers flying and has added to the congestion on Interstate 5 and other highways in California.

High Cost of Air Travel

Although there are numerous nonstop flights daily from ONT (a medium hub airport) and LAX (a large hub airport), it is very costly to drive in the Los Angeles Basin, especially due to inconsistent traffic delays on the highway system. The Los Angeles Basin is well-known across the country for traffic delays and issues. Due to the inconsistent drive times and limited service at ONT, most catchment area travelers end up driving to alternate airports, such as LAX. Those diverting customers must build in hours of additional time to avoid missing their flights. It is common for the drive from the areas around SBD to take as long as four hours to get to LAX, and passengers must build in an additional 30 to 60 minutes for parking and another 30 to 60 minutes for TSA lines. To minimize the risk of missing flights, passengers from the SBD area must leave five to six hours, at a minimum, prior to departure time at LAX, adding in significant costs in lost productivity, not to mention exorbitant parking rates at LAX.



In addition to the costs associated with hours of travel time, at the 2022 IRS allowed automobile expense of 58.5 cents per mile, it costs local travelers approximately \$90 in direct expenses to travel to/from the San Bernardino area to LAX. With the inclusion of time for these travelers, there is a significant expense for local air travelers by not having adequate access to the national air transportation system. While airfares are competitive at the larger airports in the Los Angeles Basin, SBD catchment area air travelers are paying unreasonably high fares when the cost of travel to the alternate airport is accounted for.

Past Air Service Development Efforts

SBD has taken a proactive approach to initiating air service over the past three years. **Table 3.3** provides an overview of the air service development efforts since 2019. SBD has had numerous meetings each year with airlines, both virtually and physically at their headquarters. SBD is a regular participant at many of the domestic and international air service development conferences including Routes World, Routes Americas, ACI-NA Jumpstart and Mead & Hunt's Air Service Conference. Along with the numerous meetings, SBD has completed a variety of demand studies ranging from leakage studies to Global Positioning System (GPS)-based visitation analyses.

SECTION 4. STRATEGIC PLAN

The Strategic Plan proposed by SBD will achieve the community's goals and reduce its air service deficiencies. This section provides a detailed description of the goals of the project, the detailed market analysis, and the incentive and support plan required to implement the Strategic Plan. Importantly, SBIAA/SBD has not previously received an award under the SCASDP program.

Public-Private Partnership

SBIAA, the owner/sponsor of SBD, has been designated as the sponsor of this grant application. SBIAA has formed a public-private partnership with the IVDA and Hillwood. All partners in the public-private partnership will be fully involved in the execution of the Strategic Plan (**Table 4.1**). SBIAA will execute all federal

grant offers, process all associated reimbursement requests and oversee grant administration. The IVDA will administer the revenue guarantee. Hillwood will use its extensive contacts and experience in B2B sales to promote the service. Together these partners form a team committed to improving air service to the SBD catchment area.

Project Goals

The project goal of this SCASDP grant application is to add a new route at SBD to a top 25 unserved market, thereby allowing the local community improved access to the national air transportation system and reducing leakage to LAX. By meeting this goal, the excessively high cost and inconvenience for local travelers will be reduced and the need for air travelers to drive to other airports to access air service will be mitigated.

Proposed Air Service

The top priority for the SBD market is to establish nonstop service to one of their top 25 destinations, as identified in **Table 3.2** on page 8. SBD, the IVDA and Breeze Airways partnered to establish the newly announced service to SBD's number one destination, the San Francisco Bay Area, that begins in August 2022. This SCASDP grant would expand on this recent success and partnership to ensure success for Breeze at SBD by adding a second route to another of SBD's top 25 markets. SBD and



Breeze agree that SMF is the next best destination for this market; however, Breeze is just starting West Coast service and may have to adjust their strategic priorities as their service matures. With the severe shortage of capacity in the SBD catchment area, service to a different market such as Phoenix, Salt Lake City or Seattle would also benefit the SBD catchment area. SBD will work with Breeze to identify the best alternative if SMF is not a Breeze priority going forward.

San Bernardino International Airport

Airline Participation

SBD has been working closely with Breeze for nearly a year, holding numerous in person and virtual meetings to bring the recently announced SFO service to fruition. This partnership has united the entire region in support of this new air service. Breeze has provided a letter of support for this application, and SBD has received strong support from the entire region.

Market Analysis

A financial analysis and route forecast has been developed for Breeze service to SMF. The public-private partnership understands and agrees with the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) that a thorough understanding of the target market is essential for the success of new air service. A route analysis was performed for a single roundtrip flight on a 118-seat Embraer E195 aircraft. The primary market assumption was that Breeze will capture a share of the passengers that are driving to competing airports (i.e., ONT and LAX) to travel to SMF but, most importantly, reduce the number of people driving to Sacramento.

Table 4.2 summarizes the details of the market analysis performed for Breeze service to SMF. Overall projections estimate an 82 percent load factor on the single roundtrip, resulting in 70,635 annual passengers. These passengers will be able to fly from the closer local airport in San Bernardino, instead of driving to alternate airports or driving all the way to Sacramento, significantly reducing the time and cost of traveling between these two markets as well as decreasing congestion on the area freeways.

Incentive and Support Plan

In today's airline environment, community support packages have become increasingly important and virtually required for most new service. To be effective, support packages must be structured to address the issues of new airline entry and ensure that the market responds guickly. The public-



private partnership proposes a community support package that has been tested and proven to be successful. To reduce an airline's breakeven period and offset the risk during start-up, the public-private partnership proposes the following incentives (refer to **Exhibit 4.1**): marketing campaign (create service awareness); revenue guarantee (reduce airline risk); and fee waivers (reduce airline start-up costs).

EXHIBIT 4.1 INCENTIVE PLAN



Marketing Campaign

SBD is new to scheduled passenger service, and the biggest challenge will be to effectively increase awareness of the new service. With this in mind, SBD has created a comprehensive marketing plan to promote the new Breeze service to SMF. SBD proposes to launch a multi-faceted pre- and post-launch marketing program at a total cost of \$250,000. The budget will be adjusted between the various mediums based on real-time results in order to have the most effective marketing campaign possible.

The marketing campaign will begin three months prior to launch of the new service and continue throughout the first year of service. SBD will work hand-in-hand with organizations throughout the Inland Empire to promote the new service to help ensure success.

TARGET AUDIENCE

The following market segments have been identified as the core target audiences:

- Business travelers Convenience oriented and receptive to time-saving/ease of use benefits.
- Leisure travelers Price sensitive travelers who are looking for the best value and are receptive to unique cost-saving benefits.

The key to successfully targeting these audiences is to define specific messages for each segment, then to deliver those messages through specific media channels focused on the appropriate target audience. It takes more than one exposure to win a customer, so ensuring consistent, repeated messages are visible across all media formats will establish and solidify service success.



ADVERTISING CAMPAIGN

The purpose of the advertising campaign is to increase public awareness of SBD and the new service to SMF. SBD intends to use a strategy involving print, broadcast and digital marketing to inform the public of the new air service and encourage its use. GPS, mobile tracking data will be used to understand which neighborhoods and cities are most likely to use SBD and to drill down to have significantly more effective marketing for the marketing campaign to be even more successful.

Print: Print advertising in limited use can be an efficient way to reach a broad, general consumer base within a defined geographical area, while delivering an abundance of information at the same time. Print advertisements will be written and produced for publications promoting the new service and emphasizing the "Fly SBD" advantage.

Radio: Radio has the ability to achieve the highest message frequency among the primary target groups and will greatly enhance the overall campaign, particularly when used in combination with the print and digital advertisements. Additional value-added incentives, including events, sponsorships and contests, will be negotiated as well.

Digital: Digital marketing has the ability to surgically target specific zip codes or even neighborhoods that have been identified to be the most likely to use SBD.

PROMOTIONS CAMPAIGN

The goal of the promotions campaign is to communicate to the public the convenience and ease of the new SMF service. The widespread use of the Internet for both researching and purchasing air travel will play a key role in the promotion of new air service from SBD. SBD will promote "Fly SBD" across all social media and digital presence. A search engine submission program will be maintained to ensure the new service from SBD tops the list in relevant Internet searches.

Social media will play a crucial role in building awareness of the new service while cultivating an ongoing relationship with customers. Popular social media channels, i.e., Twitter and Facebook, offer effective ways for SBD to interact directly with passengers in real time.

PUBLIC RELATIONS CAMPAIGN

Public relations are an umbrella function, incorporating activities such as corporate communications, public affairs and even advertising. The unifying element is the development of a positive image for Breeze's service at SBD within the Inland Empire. The public relations campaign will include the following strategies: media releases, articles in the trade or industry press, trade shows, media kits, newsletters and speaker's bureau. The goal for the overall public relations campaign is to increase public awareness and support of SBD.



Revenue Guarantee

As the airline industry continues to experience significant turbulence through pilot and mechanic shortages, skyrocketing fuel prices and demand impacts due to the pandemic, it is more critical than ever for a community to partner with an airline to reduce an airline's risk and provide incentive to continue to grow the SBD market. This Strategic Plan includes a revenue guarantee as part of the community support package. Although market analyses indicate nonstop service would be profitable, service ramp-up and breakeven can take up to 12 months, particularly in a market with significant barriers-to-entry. It is anticipated that an airline would require at least a \$1,500,000 revenue guarantee to initiate service at SBD.

Fee Waivers

The air service support program includes a waiver of landing fees, terminal rents, office space and baggage make-up fees that are associated with the new service to SMF. Fee waivers for the SMF service are estimated at \$129,300. Fee waivers will vary based on the type of aircraft used, frequency of service and other factors.

Strategic Plan Funding

The public-private partnership is requesting U.S. DOT assistance in funding 53 percent, or \$1,000,000, of the Strategic Plan. SBD and the community will fund 47 percent of the total proposed air service program. Non-airport revenue sources will provide 43 percent of the cash requirement and 40 percent of the funding for the total program (**Table 4.3**). The commitment of \$750,000 of local, non-airport funds show the level of importance this potential new service is to the San Bernardino and greater Inland Empire areas.

Project Continuation and Sustainability

Based on the positive market analysis, it is anticipated that service will be self-sustaining after the start-up period which can take up to 12 months or more. However, the public-private partnership understands that service failure is often due to the lack of awareness in the community. The San Bernardino business community and the public-private partnership understand the economic importance of this project to the region and the challenges associated with profitably operating air service to the San Bernardino market and will work to ensure its long-term success.



Alternate Plan

If SBD fails to obtain service to SMF on Breeze, SBD will work with Breeze to identify the next best opportunity from the SBD catchment area's top 25 markets to provide access to the national air transportation system. Since Breeze is a new West Coast airline entrant, their focus on specific areas may prioritize another top SBD destination as the best market for growth. Alternate service to a different top 25 destination would fulfill the goals of this grant application of improving service and reducing the need to drive to alternate airports from the Inland Empire.



SECTION 5. SCHEDULE AND MONITORING

The public-private partnership has developed a realistic timetable for achieving the project goals. This section provides critical milestones to be achieved by the public-private partnership to timely execute this air service initiative. A monitoring program is also provided to track the progress of the project.

Milestones for Timely Completion of Project

Target dates are proposed in **Table 5.1** to track the progress of this air service initiative assuming a grant award by September 30, 2022.

I am writing to express my support the long-envisioned San Bernardino International Airport (SBD) Small Community Air Service Development Project (SCASDP). The communities in California's 8th Congressional District welcome the opportunity to provide additional travel and transportation options to our residents, businesses, and their customers.

The revitalization and resurgence of the former Norton Air Force Base has long been anticipated, and we know that SBD relies on the full use of this critical aeronautical asset for our businesses, employees, and the larger Southern California region. Safe and sustainable commercial air passenger service is the natural progression for this still disadvantaged community, after the military base closure in 1988. Since the closure, the local reuse authorities have been able to create and retain over 14,500 new direct jobs, generating over \$3 billion in total economic output. This project will only serve to increase that progress substantially.

As a community stakeholder in the former Norton Air Force Base reuse efforts, I support the renewed efforts for SCASDP funding requests.
