# Table of size standards

SBA's table of small business size standards helps small businesses assess their business size.

The table of size standards can also be found online in the small business size regulations set forth in the <u>Electronic</u> Code of Federal Regulations 2.

Certain government programs, such as SBA loan programs and contracting opportunities, are reserved for small businesses. In order to qualify, businesses must satisfy SBA's definition of a small business concern, along with the size standards for small business.

What is a small business size standard?

A size standard, which is usually stated in number of employees or average annual Download .pdf

receipts, represents the largest size that a business (including its subsidiaries and affiliates) may be to remain classified as a small business for SBA and federal contracting programs. The definition of "small" varies by industry.

Size standards are mostly based on the average annual receipts or the average number of employees.
